

Land of the Samurai:

How did Japan produce the world's fiercest warriors?

History of the Samurai and the Edo Period

Edo Period (1603–1868):

Major events to remember:

- 1603: **Tokugawa Ieyasu** establishes the shogunate.
- 1630s: Japan closes its borders, entering a period of **isolation** (Sakoku).
- 1853: **Commodore Perry** of the United States arrives, leading to Japan opening to foreign influence.

Feudal Japan:

Society was structured in a strict hierarchy, with the **emperor** at the top, followed by the **shogun**, **daimyo** (lords), **samurai** (warriors), and peasants.

Bushido – The Way of the Warrior:

Bushido was the **moral code** that samurai lived by, emphasizing **loyalty**, **honor**, **courage**, and **self-discipline**.

Failure to uphold these values could lead to **seppuku** (ritual suicide), showing their commitment to honor.

The Mongol Invasion (1274 and 1281):

Japan was attacked twice by Mongol forces, but the invasions were unsuccessful due to the Japanese defense and a **kamikaze** (divine wind) that destroyed Mongol fleets.

Samurai Arms and Armour:

Samurai used **katana** (swords), **yumi** (bows), and **spears**. Their armor, including **kabuto** (helmets) and body protection, was designed to be both protective and flexible, supporting their style of fighting on horseback or on foot.

End of the Samurai:

The samurai era came to an end after the **Meiji Restoration** in 1868, when Japan modernized its military and adopted Western technologies, making the traditional samurai obsolete.

Geography of Japan

Locating Japan: Japan is an island nation in East Asia, located in the Pacific Ocean. It consists of four main islands: **Honshu**, **Hokkaido**, **Kyushu**, and **Shikoku**. Major cities include **Tokyo**, **Kyoto**, and **Osaka**.
